Chairman's Report by Chris Fribbins

The consultations on the future of ticket offices have concluded that they provide a vital service for passengers, especially those who face barriers to accessing rail travel.

Whilst the headline is good news, we wait to see what will happen next. We hope that Continuing current ticket office arrangements will not mean cuts elsewhere, the best way to reduce Taxpayer contributions is to grow the fare box – with a reliable, welcoming railway providing services that encourage more passengers to make more journeys.

The 750,000 response to the proposals contain

a wealth of information about what passengers,

particularly those who need help to travel by train, want and need to travel successfully. It is essential that data is used effectively in planning the future of the railway.

Fares reform remains essential. A new structure is required that is logical and understandable to the average traveller.

Simplification is often mapped to there being just a few fares – whilst a very considerable reduction (from 2,822 ticket types on National Rail, with 901 names and 665 restriction codes) is essential, the number that remain is less important than that they make sense and the trade-offs between price, time of travel and flexibility are coherent.



Snodland Over 55's Advice Fair

We were delighted to accept an invitation from Tracey Crouch MP to attend the over 55s Advice and Information Fair at Snodland on Monday 23rd October.

We were one of eighty organisations at the event, working with Southeastern to share information and ideas to inspire people to Give The Train A Try, promote the British Transport Police 61016 service and listen to the concerns of rail users.

We engaged with over 120 people, promoting Railcards, assisted travel services

and the beautiful countryside that can be explored on a Rail Ramble from our stations.

Award Nominations For Hollingbourne



Hollingbourne Station has received a "Highly Commended" accolade at the 2023 National Railway Heritage Awards.

On-line submissions detailed how the project has taken the station building from being a derelict shell to a thriving community hub, and judges came to the station to see the transformation that has taken place before deciding to shortlist the project.

The nomination recognises the huge dedication shown by the local community to re-imagine this space and the ongoing work to bring it into regular community use



with film nights, community events and the launch of the Signal Box café which opens regularly on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 6:30am-8:00am for the early risers and 9:30am-4:00pm.

Travel Safe Travel Smart Sheppey College



At the end of November we took a group of thirteen students from Sheppey College to the Travel Safe Travel Smart rail safety centre at Margate.

The learning began as we travelled, with reminders to keep behind the yellow line on platforms and to let

people off of the train before boarding. Coaching was provided on the use of display screens to check which platform your train is leaving from and the time it is due to arrive.

Once at the centre Nicola Dooris and Catherine Lamb led sessions designed to raise awareness of the dangers of tresspassing, facilities available to make your journey easier and how to get help from railway staff and the British Transport Police. Hard hitting videos from the You vs Train educational resources reinforced the messages to keep off the tracks and stay behind the yellow line as being key to staying safe from the dangers of moving trains and the electricity that powers them.

On the journey back students were asked if they felt scared about using the railway. Everybody said that they were now able to use the railway safely, understood the dangers of tresspass and knew how to get help and assistance should they need it.



Kent Rail Summit

We heard updates on eticketing, the Thanet Parkway story and progress on restoring international rail services to Kent.
